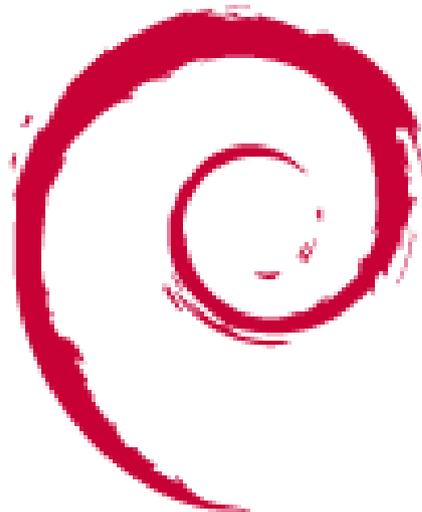

- Free Software
- For the “hardcore” hobbist

Technical Advantages

- Trailing edge
 - Traditional territory for Free Software
 - Entry point
- Cutting edge
 - State-of-the-Art technology
- Stability

Trailing Edge

- Cheap, light workstations
 - Diskless workstations
 - FAI
- Low-end servers
 - Mail, HTTP, FTP, Printer, SMB
 - Firewalls, Routers, Bridges
- Clustering and High Availability

Cutting Edge

- APT
 - Remote installations
 - Roll forward / Roll backward
 - Not tied to a version
- Security
 - SE Linux
 - Snort, Nessus
- Policy Manual

Stability

- Stable is truly stable
- Bug Tracking System
 - Open process
 - Fix and clean upstream bugs
- security.debian.org
 - Backport fixes
 - Professional security team

Political Advantages

- Free to own
- Free forever
- Free to act
- Free to share
- Free to leave

Disadvantages

- TANSTAAFL
- No hand holding
- Fix it yourself in times of urgency
- Standards compliant
- Responsibility
